It is a great honour to be in Wellington in this prestigious venue for the celebration of the National Day of Colombia. 204 years have passed since the 20th of July 1810, when we became an independent nation.

Today we can proudly affirm that our democratic institutions have helped us to surpass many challenges and that we have become a safer, more modern and fairer country.

Colombia has now become the third economy in Latin America and the 27th in the

world. In the last three years, our economy grew above the regional and world

average. In 2013 we reached a growth rate of 4.3% and a Foreign Direct Investment –

FDI of USD16.772 million, a record figure in our history. This figures represent a

growing confidence in the stability of our country and in the strength of our

economy.

On June 15th, President Juan Manuel Santos was re-elected, according to our

Constitution, for another four year term. And one of the main objectives of this new

mandate is to turn over the page of violence and confrontation and to reach an

agreement to put an end to a long conflict, to acknowledge and repair victims, to

foster reconciliation among Colombians and to build a lasting and endurable peace.

In this fundamental purpose, we are being accompanied by all the Latin American

countries, International Organizations and the international community as a whole.

Our nation expects to build peace through democratic participation and to ban

armed confrontation from our territory.

Our foreign policy during the last four years has been very dynamic in establishing

close links with New Zealand as an important partner in the Asia Pacific region and

there is a firm commitment and continuity in this purpose of building a strong agenda

between our two countries.

The Visit of Prime Minister John Key to Colombia in March 2013 was indeed a

historical occasion in our bilateral relations. It was followed by the opening of our

Consulate General in Auckland, the celebration of Bilateral Foreign Policy

Consultations held last November in Wellington, high level meetings in Bogotá and

other cities of the Ministers of Trade and Agriculture of New Zealand, accompanied

by a delegation of businessmen. Technical missions from the Colombian Ministry of

Agriculture, FEDEGAN, which is our association of cattle breeders and CORPOICA, our

corporation for agricultural research, visited New Zealand in February 2014,

indicating the interest to build a solid cooperation based on the main pillars of our

growing agenda: Trade and investment, agribusiness, education -including vocational

training.

As members of the Pacific Alliance, together with Mexico, Peru and Chile, we

welcomed the interest of New Zealand in approaching our process, by becoming an

Observer State to this innovative and pragmatic platform of integration. Colombia is

leading the Group of External Relations of the Pacific Alliance and we are glad to have

already established areas of collaboration with New Zealand.

We particularly welcome the initiative of establishing a Pacific Alliance Integration

Pacific Forum, where we can share experiences with New Zealand, regarding both

the Closer Economic Relations -CER- integration scheme and the CER-ASEAN

experience.

Colombia firmly believes in consolidating the partnership with New Zealand in

political and economic terms. We will support New Zealand in its aspiration to

become a Non -Permanent Member of the Security Council and we will continue

working in areas of common interest at other for ssuch as the WTO and the Cairns

Group. Our common agenda, as I mentioned before, is a solid one in its economic,
